





- Most colleges are interested in only your four years of high school.
- Include honor-roll recognition, essay-writing awards, science competitions, and the like.

### **Extra-curricular Activities**

- This category includes clubs you've belonged to, class offices you've held, sports, band, yearbook, and all the other nonacademic activities you've done.
- Don't forget non-school-related items such as volunteering at a nursing home and jobs you've worked.
- Include special interests like photography, hiking, writing, and so forth.

# The College Essay/Personal Statement

### **Choose a Topic That Will Highlight You**

**Don't** focus on the great aspects of a particular college, the amount of dedication it takes to be a doctor or the number of extracurricular activities you took part in during high school.

**Do** share your personal story and thoughts, take a creative approach and highlight areas that aren't covered in other parts of the application, like your high school records.

#### **Keep Your Focus Narrow and Personal**

**Don't** try to cover too many topics. This will make the essay sound like a résumé that doesn't provide any details about you.

**Do** focus on one aspect of yourself so the readers can learn more about who you are. Remember that the readers must be able to find your main idea and follow it from beginning to end. Ask a parent or teacher to read just your introduction and tell you what he or she thinks your essay is about.

#### Show, Don't Tell

**Don't** simply state a fact to get an idea across, such as "I like to surround myself with people with a variety of backgrounds and interests."

**Do** include specific details, examples, reasons and so on to develop your ideas. For the example above, describe a situation when you were surrounded by various types of people. What were you doing? Whom did you talk with? What did you take away from the experience?

#### **Use Your Own Voice**

**Don't** rely on phrases or ideas that people have used many times before. These could include statements like, "There is so much suffering in the world that I feel I have to help people." Avoid overly formal or business-like language, and don't use unnecessary words.

**Do** write in your own voice. For the above example, you could write about a real experience that you had and how it made you feel you had to take action. And note that admission officers will be able to tell if your essay was edited by an adult.

#### Ask a Teacher or Parent to Proofread

**Don't** turn your essay in without proofreading it, and don't rely only on your computer's spell check to catch mistakes. A spell-check program will miss typos like these:

- "After I graduate form high school, I plan to get a summer job."
- "From that day on, Daniel was my best fried."

**Do** ask a teacher or parent to proofread your essay to catch mistakes. You should also ask the person who proofreads your essay if the writing sounds like you. (collegeboard.org)





- You will register for your PIN and, with your parents help, you will input your family's tax income information.

### • CSS Profile:

- By filling out one form, you can apply online for nonfederal financial aid from almost 300 colleges and scholarship programs.
- <u>https://student.collegeboard.org/css-financial-aid-profile</u>
- Only specific schools require the CSS Profile. Be sure that the schools you are applying to require the form before you complete and submit it."
- **o** Your profile is a non-federal student aid
- o How to Apply and What Documents are needed.
  - Complete application
  - Parents tax returns, W-2, and bank statements
  - ALSO you do not need to complete the application in one sitting

### • Educational Opportunity Fund: EOF

- 0 http://www.nj.gov/highereducation/EOF/
- **o** assists low-income residents who are capable and motivated but lack adequate preparation for college study
- **o** eligibility is based on income and you must be a first generation college student in your family
- Students enrolled in an EOF program receive financial assistance through grants ranging from \$200 to \$2,500.
- **o** These grants are renewable annually based upon continued eligibility.
- **o** Students also receive support services such as counseling, tutoring, and developmental course work.
- There are a limited number of student spaces available at each campus program so it is important to apply early.
- **o** Final determination of eligibility is made by the campus director.


